





We aim at building up humane and socially committed young men and women through education. The basic objective of the institution is to provide education to the marginalized sections of the society. The college stands for academic excellence as well as development of the skill and character of students based on the Holy Guru's perspectives on humanism, secularism and universal brotherhood.

#### 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The College ensures a system of participative management whereby information flow and decision- making processes are systematised and channelled through all key constituents of the College. The suggestions given by the Governing Body, the Management Committee and the Finance Committee are implemented by the various administrative offices, under the leadership and guidance of the Principal. The Heads of departments ensure the smooth functioning of the activities of the department in collaboration with other members of the department. Regular meetings of the Staff Council are held to discuss and decide on matters relating to academics and administration. For the smooth and effective functioning of the College, interactions with stakeholders comprising of faculty, parents, alumnae and the students, are regularly organised.

#### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Since the college is affiliated to University of Kerala, duly constituted academic bodies like Academic Council, Board of Studies and Faculty undertake the curriculum development process.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Formulate academic calendar for individual departments and examination calendar with the help of internal examination committee in the beginning of the year and students are informed.
- Monitor academic procedures through College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) and give necessary feedbacks to the departments on academic activities.
- To analyse the feedback from the students on yearly basis for monitoring efficiency of teaching and evaluation practice and methodologies. A vigilant review of testing and evaluation patterns ensures creativity, originality and analytical thinking
- For all programmes practical orientation is insisted in the form of projects, industrial visit, workshops, seminars and symposium.
- Group discussions.
- Efforts have been taken to improve the quality of Teaching-learning by using ICT enabled classrooms in the College.
- Peer teaching within and outside the class hours.
- Remedial teaching.
- Guided library assignments, group discussion, debates, quiz, etc.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The college has an internal exam committee, which monitors the regular conduct of at least one internal exam for all courses in a semester.
- The College Level Monitoring Committee and Department Level Monitoring Committee and faculty advisors monitor the continuous evaluation of students as part of formative assessment exams.
- Tutors make an analysis of the performance of students after every internal examination and at the end of every semester university examinations.
- Teacher evaluation by students is done through a formal feedback mechanism, which is done at the end or every academic year.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- The research committee motivates the faculty and students to undertake research activities either as academic programme or project works. The committee provides all information about the research areas, leading research institutes available, financial assistance and funding bodies, supportive institutions, etc.
- The committee facilitates the availability of expert discourses in the institution and elsewhere too. Details regarding minor and major research projects and postdoctoral fellowships were intimated timely.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Digital library facilities with National and International online journals are provided. Library administrations like issue / return of books are maintained through commercial library software. Every year, additional volumes of books are added based on the requirements from all the departments.
- Renewal of subscription to e-journals and e-books was done through N-LIST college component of the UGC- INFONET Digital Library Consortium.
- CCTV camera surveillance.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The teaching faculty in this institution are entrusted with decentralized administrative powers and responsibilities for smooth functioning of the college. Various Statutory bodies, committees and clubs give ample support to the college for curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and other main functions of the college.
- Teaching faculty is motivated to attend various training programmes and workshops to keep up to-date with academic developments.

- Admission of students is done through online Central Allotment Process of the parent University. The college could conduct admission by following the seat matrix, through online protocol of the University and could fill maximum seats in 8 programmes as per the options and preferences of the students
- The Admission Committee of the college monitors and supervises the part of the admission processes that are to be performed at the college level. Government rules were strictly followed for preparing the rank list. All reservation policies of the Government were strictly followed.

Department provides a common platform to share knowledge and to plan strategies for modern drug research by intellectual interaction with experts in the field. In this context, the department organized a workshop under the sponsorship of Kerala State Science, Technology and Environment (KSCSTE) to promote the

scientific aspirations of post graduation students, researchers, faculties from various colleges in Kerala.

#### 2. NSS- Pampa-Varattar
